The Specifics:

Thursday, October 18, 6:00 PM: We will meet at the CUH storage shed to gather and transport show materials to the Sand Point show site. Volunteers with trucks and vans would be especially useful and appreciated.

Sunday, October 26, 6:00 PM: Take down and transport materials back to CUH.

FALL IDENTIFICATION CLASS Colin Meyer

A Beginning Identification class will be held on five weeknight evenings, 7:00 – 9:00 PM, starting Monday, October 21. This class will introduce participants to the identification of gilled and non-gilled mushrooms, collecting and cooking practices, and mushroom toxins. <u>Mushrooms Demystified</u>, by David Arora, will be the text; it is available at the PSMS bookstore, and on the first day of class. UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS

Each field trip will be lead by an experienced volunteer, who will meet with the participants at the field trip site between 9:00 and 10:00 AM and again from noon to 1:00 PM. PSMS identifiers will be on hand to identify the finds. Participants are responsible for bringing their own food, firewood, picnic utensils, etc., and organizing a potluck.

October 5

Masonic Park UPDATE

The space we have rented is called Peterson's Hall (not the "big kitchen area"). It is located a quarter mile further into the park; watch for PSMS signs to guide you.

October 12

Soda Springs Campground (elev. 3100 ft, 130 miles southeast of Seattle)

From Enumclaw, SE of Seattle, continue east on State Hwy. 410 over Chinook Pass. About 17 miles past the summit, turn right onto Bumping Lake Road (FR 18). About 5 miles farther, turn left into the camp.

October 26-27

PSMS/Mountaineers Weekend

This is a two-day event in cooperation with The Mountaineers at their Meany Ski Lodge east of Snoqualmie Pass. Saturday includes collecting, setting up display tables, and an evening program. Sunday includes a review of collections, local collecting, and preparing mushrooms for part of our lunch.

Accommodations are dormitory-style. Bring a sleeping bag and pillow, personal items, and a lunch to eat Saturday while collecting. The cost is \$35 and includes Saturday dinner, Sunday breakfast, and Sunday lunch. No alcohol in lodge. No pets.

Registration is required. Call The Mountaineers, (206) 284-8484, between October 1 and October 23 to sign up. People canceling after 5 PM on October 23 must pay for food. We may be able to arrange car pools at 8¼ cents/mile or \$10 for this trip. If you need a ride or you can take passengers, say so (and specify how many) when you register and ask when to call back about your ride or riders. Pay at the lodge.

Participants will meet at the Crystal Springs Forest Campground at 9:30 AM to go collecting. (Go east on I-90, make a right-hand U-turn at Stampede Pass exit #62, and go a quarter mile to the campground.) Group leaders will bring participants back to the lodge about 3 PM. *Host: Coleman Leuthy*.

We need mushroom donations for our evening meal. In order to figure out what needs to be purchased, please call and tell Coleman, (206) 322-2554, what and how much you can donate by Wednesday evening, October 23.

November 2

Quinault Foray

Drive south on I-5 past Olympia to Hwy. 101, then west to Aberdeen. Go through Aberdeen to Hoquiam, following 101 north past Humtulips and Neilton. At Amanda Park slow down, and turn right on North Shore Road. Continue 1 mile to Kamp Kiwanis, which is at 200 North Shore Road on Lake Quinault. *Hosts: Don Lennebacker and Karin Mendell*.

Note: The Wishkah Bridge (Hwy. 12) in Aberdeen will be closed for five weeks in either October or January. Traffic will be detoured over the Heron Street bridge before returning to Wishkah Street. The DOT has maps available on their website, <u>www.wsdot.wa.gov</u> (click on the Olympic area of the state map in the lower left column).

November 9

Twanoh State Park

(elev. near sea level, 20 miles SW of Seattle by ferry)

Take the downtown Seattle–Bremerton ferry. From Bremerton, drive south on State Hwy. 3 past Belfair, then bear right onto Hwy. 106. Continue another seven miles to the park.

November 16 Deception Pass State Park (elev. near sea level, 80 miles north of Seattle)

From Seattle take I-5 north to Mt. Vernon. Take exit #226 and go west on State Hwy. 536 for about five miles, where it joins Hwy 20. Continue west on Hwy 20, then turn south on Hwy 20 South and drive six miles across the bridge at Deception Pass to the park, which is on the right.

I-90 CORRIDOR SURVEY: COLLECTING CONTINUES THRU FALL 2002 Tim Leavitt

Hello! I'm Tim Leavitt, forest service mycologist for the Cle Elum Ranger district, and we are once again looking for PSMS volunteers to collect fungi for the I-90 Corridor Survey. To date, the Survey has identified twenty-five protected species of fungi in the I-90 project area (one mile on either

side of I-90 between Hyak and Easton). Your PSMS volunteer efforts will help to protect habitat connectivity in the Cascades. The collecting got started with two kick-off BBQ's in September courtesy of PSMS. New PSMS member Leesa Wright, a recent graduate of Evergreen State, is currently working with me on this project. (Good job, Leesa!)

Leesa and I are looking for volunteers to collect on Mondays and Tuesdays, through the Fall 2002 mushroom season, the last one for the Survey.

P.S. On September 27 we found our first Matsutake! They're coming!

To join the Survey collecting activities:

- Meet Monday and Tuesday mornings at 9:00 AM
- Meet at Cabin Creek Exit (exit #63) off I-90, on the south side (parking lot)
- Bring your lunch (noon break)
- Collecting continues throughout the day, usually ending around 4:30 PM (or earlier, by preference)
- I can be available on some additional days; let me know Mondays or Tuesdays and we can arrange for individual collecting times.

- Two-Way Radios: Staff will be using two-way radios so that assistance may be called upon in the event of problems.
- Badges: Ail PSMS volunteers should receive an official badge. Please wear your badge at all times!
