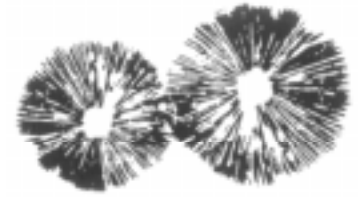

40TH ANNUAL WILD MUSHROOM SHOW – MORE IMPORTANT DETAILS

Security: Though we won't actually have a Security Committee this year, we will still offer the following security measures at the fall show to protect our members' belongings and safety:

- *Safe Room:* A locked room will be available on the premises for storing purses or other personal valuables. If you chose not to use this space, we recommend you use your locked car. However, please be aware that thefts have occurred and take appropriate precautions.
- *Two-Way Radios:* Two-way radios will be issued to various staff members, so that they can call for assistance in the event of problems. *We recommend calling "911" for any emergency assistance!* We hope that being able to communicate quickly will speed problem resolution.
- *Badges:* All PSMS volunteers should receive an official badge with the poster logo on it from their committee chair or other members manning tables or show areas. Please wear your badge while working at the show. This will help us identify you as part of the staff.

We will again have parking privileges northeast of Building #406 for show staff and vendors. Since this is a public space, no special PSMS parking may be roped off. Since the Seattle Book Fest is again occurring simultaneously with the PSMS show, we will again ask for volunteers to assist us with parking and traffic control. We feel this is necessary because of the large crowds generated by the Book Fest. Please consider volunteering to help with this task throughout the weekend.

Bus and Shuttle Service: Book Fest is providing free bus service from many area book stores. Check the Book Fest website or advertisements to find out the locations. We suggest car pooling or riding the bus to lessen our traffic/parking problems.

Book Fest is also providing a free shuttle service within Sand Point Magnuson Park. We will have more details on how this shuttle service will operate by the October meeting, but we have been advised that our members are welcome to use it.

as prepared for the Sept. 9, 2003, PSMS membership meeting

- 6 fresh Shiitake, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups cold water
- 1/8 tsp baking soda
- 1-2/3 cups flour

Whip the egg yolk and baking soda into the water. Sift in the flour and mix well, Dip mushrooms, coating thoroughly. Fry 1 min on each side. Sprinkle with spice or other seasoning.

PSMS is again offering a fall foray for our members. We will be meeting at the Circle 8 Ranch, which proved to be a great resource during our spring foray there in May. The Circle 8 Ranch is located just off I-90 between C and Easton, only 1.5 hours from Seattle. The ranch is a beautiful, pastoral setting with three A-frame cabins and a very comfortable—we actually have springs and

Please bring layered clothing for warmth while collecting. Please bring changes in case we have rain. As usual for this type of foray, you need to bring your own towels and toiletries.

The foray dates are October 31–November 2. These dates, of course, suggest that a mushroom-themed costume party might be in order—anyone so inspired, please bring your costume, and we'll try to accommodate you on Friday night.

Bryce Kendrick, author of *The Fifth Kingdom* and over 300 mycological publications, will be our foray mycologist. Bryce will provide a slide presentation and talk both Friday and Saturday nights.

Chef Michael Blackwell has graciously consented to be our foray chef, and we all look forward to sharing meals with him during the foray. Anyone attending our September membership meeting had an advance opportunity to sample Michael's culinary magic!

Space is limited to 50 participants, so don't delay in making your reservation. Your check will hold your spot and must be received no later than October 15. The fee for the foray will be \$50.00 per person to cover room and board. There are bedding accommodations for the first 38 reservations, with the remaining 12 spaces available to tent or RV campers. (No discount will be available to tent or RV campers, as most of the fee goes toward food and facility rental.)

Remember that no child care is provided at our forays, so children need to be supervised by parents at all times. We have been advised by the property owners that dogs are allowed on the property *on leash only*. Pets are not allowed in any buildings. Please consider this if you wish to bring yours.

FALL FIELD TRIPS

Field trips start at 9 AM. Remember to dress for the weather. Bring a compass, whistle, and watch for safety. Potlucks are fun, so plan ahead and bring something to share. A club identifier will be available at all field trips.

October 4 **Masonic Park "Big Kitchen"**

This site, convenient to Barlow Pass and Mt. Dickerman, has a wide variety of mushrooms, including choice edibles such as chanterelles, matsutake, boletes, and hedgehogs. The Masons charge a fee of \$2 per car upon entry; camping is included if you so desire. *Hosts: Ross and Val Orthus*

Driving Directions: From Snohomish, take State Hwy. 9 to State Hwy. 92. Turn right and follow Hwy. 92 through Granite Falls. Four miles east of Granite Falls, turn left at the Masonic Park sign. PSMS signs will guide you to the big kitchen.

October 11 **Chatter Creek** (elev. 2400 ft, 150 miles east of Seattle)

This lovely spot is reserved for the whole weekend, including camping Friday and Saturday nights in the group site. Trailhead passes are needed within ¼ mile of established trails. The campground has produced both white chanterelles and matsutake a short walk from the group site.

Driving Directions: Take Hwy. 2 over Stevens Pass and proceed 34 miles to the first Leavenworth intersection. Turn right and proceed 16.1 miles up Icicle Road to the Chatter Creek campground. Follow the PSMS signs to the group site. You can also take I-90 over Snoqualmie Pass to exit #85 and go over Swauk Pass to Hwy. 2. Turn left, go through Leavenworth to the north side, turn left on Icicle Road for 16.1 miles, and follow the PSMS signs.

October 25 **PSMS/Mountaineers Joint Field Trip**

Join with Mountaineers for a weekend at Meany Lodge. Call the Mountaineers, (206) 284-8484, to register and for directions. PSMS signs will be posted on the Stampede Pass road to help as it's a little tricky to find. Register NOW as it fills fast with Mountaineers. Cost is \$40. (See article in this issue.)

October 25 **New Castle Beach Park**

This Renton Park is nearby for your driving convenience. Look for chanterelles "for the pot."

Driving Directions: From I-405, take exit #9 to 112th Ave SE, go west at the top of ramp toward Lake Washington, and turn right onto Lake Washington Blvd. Continue into park.

November 8 **Twanoh State Park**

Alas, this lovely park on Hood Canal is closed for camping. We will meet in the day use/picnic shelter. Washington State collects a \$5 per car parking fee.

Driving Directions: Take the Bremerton Ferry (a half hour ride) from downtown Seattle, take Hwy. 3 southwest to Belfair, and go west 8 miles on Hwy. 106 from Belfair to the park.

November 15

Deception Pass State Park

Meet at the Cranberry Lake shelter. A \$5 parking fee is collected at the entrance unless you are camping, in which case your camping receipt includes parking. This saltwater campground is open year round. No potluck as it gets dark so early. There are several delicious restaurants in LaConner for a friendly dinner.

Driving Directions: Head north on I-5 to exit #230, and go 18 miles west toward Oak Harbor. The park entrance is on the right 1 mile past the Deception Pass Bridge, one of the most photographed scenic places in the state.



PSMS/THE MOUNTAINEERS WEEKEND, October 25–26 Coleman Leuthy

This year we will share the Meany Lodge mushroom weekend with the Pacific NW Mycological Society. As in the past, Saturday will feature the collection, identification, setting up of a mini-mushroom display, a gourmet dinner including mushrooms collected earlier in the day, and an evening program about mushrooms. On Sunday there will be local collecting, a review of the display, and a seminar on mushroom preparation and cooking.

There will be three sumptuous meals for your enjoyment. Coleman Leuthy, a knowledgeable mushroom guide, and PSMS assistants will lead you on the collecting forays and help with the identification of your collections.

Bring lunch for Saturday only, along with a basket, a box, or large paper bags to carry your treasures. Include small wax-paper sandwich bags for individual, small collections. Bring a sleeping bag, pillow, towel, etc., for dormitory accommodations. Club policy: No alcohol in the lodge and no pets. Cost: \$40. This includes a gourmet dinner Saturday, Sunday breakfast and lunch, and overnight lodge fees.

Meet Saturday at 9:30 AM at Crystal Springs Forest Camp. Take I-5 east over Snoqualmie Pass to Exit 62, turn right at the top of the exit ramp, and continue a quarter mile. The campground is straight ahead at the sharp left bend in the road, before the bridge. We will break into small foray groups here and go collecting. About 3 PM, group leaders will guide you to the lodge.

For additional information call Coleman Leuthy at (206) 322-2554. To sign up call The Mountaineer clubhouse at (206) 284-8484. Note: This event sells out every year, so make your reservation early!

Driving Directions: Meany Lodge is 64 miles east of Seattle. Drive east from Seattle on I-90 to Exit 62. Turn right and proceed south on Forest Service Road #54 for 1.6 miles. Turn left on Forest Service Road #420 and proceed for 1.7 miles to the railroad tracks. Parallel the tracks until you reach the crossing, cross, and proceed a couple of hundred yards up the hill to the lodge. Use care when crossing the tracks; the trains are quiet and fast.

Again this year the challenge is trying to decide what mushroom activities to participate in!

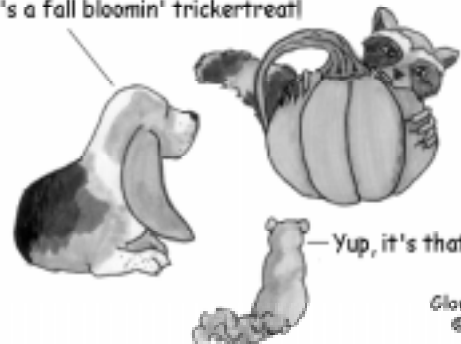
