PAULINE SHIOSAKI'S CHICKEN TERIYAKI

- 1/4 C saki or sherry
- 1/4 C sugar
- 1/2 C Japanese soy (Kikoman)
- 1 t grated fresh ginger
- 1 t monosodium glutamate
- 1 clove garlic, optional

This is enough marinade for a 2 1/2# fryer. Marinate 4-6 hrs, turning several times, or overnight. Drain. (Cut thighs in

half and cut half the meat off drumstick, so all pieces will be same size and cook at same rate.) Lay in pan skin side down and turn once. Bake 325 for 30 mins.
